RESEARCH PAPER: 8-10 pages, on a topic of your choice relevant to the class. The paper must include NOTES (either footnotes or endnotes) and BIBLIOGRAPHY. Information from the internet must be cited by both address and site name, and must be accompanied by a short annotation as to why you deemed the site reliable. BEWARE: There are many neo-Nazi and Holocaust Denial sites. Your inability to identify such a source through your unwitting use of it will be taken as strong evidence that you have learned little in this course.

GRADING: The two mid-term exams will each consist of a short objective section and one essay (selected from a choice of 2-3 questions). The final exam will consist of a short objective section on the last unit of the course and two essay questions, one comprehensive and one on the last unit of the course. The exams will cover both lecture and reading. The two mid-term exams and the paper will each count 20% toward the final grade, and the final exam will count 40%.

Attendance at and participation in discussion sections may lower or raise your grade. Students who attend 8 or 9 discussion sessions will receive bonus points, as will students who consistently make exceptional contributions to discussion. Students who attend 7 of the 9 discussion sessions will "break even." Students who miss more than 2 discussion sessions will be progressively penalized. Students who know in advance that they will a discussion session for a legitimate reason (such as participation in an athletic event) may arrange with their TA *in advance* for an alternative assignment in order to receive credit for that session.
